ENGL 7350 Race and Real Estate Fall 2016

Course Description

Narratives of race and real estate in the United States have usually focused on dispossession, forced segregation, and discrimination. This course acknowledges the validity of these histories while qualifying and complicating traditional notions of race, property, and citizenship. We will draw across disciplines, from literary criticism and sociology to architecture, to examine not only the intersections among race and architecture, homeownership, and place/space, but also narrative aesthetics as sites of social storytelling.
